There, she provided direct clinical care and supervised the training of neurodevelopmental and behavioral pediatric fellows, child and adolescent psychiatry residents, pediatric residents and medical students. Her most recent clinical duties at Texas Children's were focused on the evaluation and care of patients in the Autism Center and the Fragile X Clinic.

Dr. Treadwell-Deering is certified in psychiatry and child psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. She is a member of the American Psychiatric Association, the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and the Association for Behavior Analysis International. Dr. Treadwell-Deering actively publishes and presents. Her clinical and research interests include autism spectrum disorder, and the behavioral/cognitive aspects of some genetic disorders, including Fragile X syndrome.

Dr. Treadwell-Deering said of her recruitment that it was the right opportunity at the right time in her career. She noted that other personnel critical to the development of the autism center are on-boarding this fall, and that the remodeling and expansion of physical space (at Rockland Center Two) is underway. She stated: "We are working toward offering improved access and a model of assessment and care that is patient and familyfocused as well as autism-friendly."
