Leading Duchenne Organization Awards Clinic Certification as Part of Ongoing Effort to Ensure People with Duchenne Receive Optimal Care

Nemours/Alfred I duPont Hospital for Children (Nemours) in Wilmington,	
Delaware, became the 17th clinic named a Certified Duchenne Care Center	
by <u>Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy (PPMD),</u> a nonprofit organization	
leading the fight to end <u>Duchenne muscular dystrophy (Duchenne)</u> , the most common fatal genetic disorder	
diagnosed in childhood, affecting approximately one in 5,000 boys.	

PPMD's Certified Duchenne Care Center Program, which supports standardized, comprehensive care and services for all people living with Duchenne, began certifying qualifying centers in 2014. Certification means centers maintain the highest standards in clinical and sub-specialty services, rapidly apply new evidence-based knowledge, minimize heterogeneity in clinical research outcomes, and comply with standards in clinical care that were established by the <a href="CDC Care Considerations">CDC Care Considerations</a>. As part of its ongoing mission to end Duchenne, PPMD continues to insist that all people with Duchenne receive comprehensive care.

The <u>Nemours Neuroscience Center</u> at duPont Hospital for Children provides a specialized Neuromuscular Program under the direction of pediatric neurologist <u>Dr. Mena Scavina</u>. The program offers coordinated care by a skilled team of experts in neurology, orthopedic surgery, pulmonology, advanced practice nursing, cardiology, and genetic counseling. A complement of team members from respiratory, physical and occupational therapy, social work, nutrition, rehabilitation medicine and engineering, biomedical research, behavioral health, and orthotics and prosthetics, are all available to provide care for boys with Duchenne at each clinic visit.

Dr. Scavina was delighted to receive the designation as a PPMD certified center. She said: "On behalf of our Nemours Neuromuscular Program co-directors, Dr. William Mackenzie and Dr. Robert Heinle, our Advanced Practice Nurse, Alisa Clark, and the entire team, we are honored to receive certification from Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy. We look forward to working together with PPMD and are dedicated to continuously improving the care we provide to individuals with Duchenne muscular dystrophy and their families."

Kathi Kinnett, MSN, CNP, PPMD's Senior Vice President of Clinical Care and co-director of Transforming Duchenne Care Initiative (TDCI), is pleased that Nemours is joining the list of certified centers. Kinnett says, "We are very proud to include the Nemours/Alfred I. duPont team in our growing network of CDCC's. Dr. Scavina has a compassionate team of very knowledgeable providers who have worked to meet our robust standards for certification. Families living in this area should feel confident in the care and services provided at Nemours."

Kinnett says that PPMD receives numerous requests from centers wanting to be considered for certification. "When PPMD launched our certification program in 2014, we had no idea that the Duchenne community would respond so positively. Families have come to rely on our certification as an indication that these centers are the best of the best. We will continue to certify more centers across the country throughout 2017, recognizing teams of physicians for their leadership in Duchenne care, which in turn will enable families to make the best choice for the care of their child."
